As "far-fetched" as it may seem to some of you, our finances generally mark the position of our spiritual pilgrimage. We are no farther along in our "walk" with God than the point to which we have learned to trust Christ with our giving.

I'm sure you've heard it said as I have heard it said many times that the checkbook and the prayer book are the two best indicators of a person who has the proper priorities in life. Last Sunday we talked about prayer. Today we are talking about stewardship, about giving and what's expected of us.

DEVELOPMENT

Now Jesus was born and nurtured in the most "tithe-conscious" generation of people ever to practice this dimension of God's covenant. According to William Barclay and other Biblical scholars, the Pharisees' chief criteria for authentic service to God was the giving of the tithe (the first-fruits - not the "left-overs").

The Pharisees were always trying to trap Jesus into saying or doing something against the Law and the requirements of the Torah. We do not have one shred of evidence in the Bible that this very observant group ever accused Jesus of failing to offer His tithe to God - or offering a new teaching against it. Jesus, at times, said some very challenging things to the Pharisees, but He never spoke out against their giving of the tithe.

I've always been a little suspicious of what I call "Bumper Sticker Evangelism". Most of you have seen the bumper sticker that says, "Honk If You Love Jesus". Well, recently someone has developed a more Biblical bumper sticker that says, "Tithe If You Love Jesus. Any Fool Can Honk".

There was a cartoon in a recent issue of one of the professional journals that comes across my desk. It showed a Methodist preacher standing at the door of the local United Methodist Church shaking hands with people. Several members are standing around after the service discussing the pastor's sermon on the budget, and the Chairperson of the Administrative Council was elected to speak to the pastor about his sermon that morning. The chairperson steps over to the pastor and says.

"Pastor...you sure had us worried about your sermon today...until you said, 'And I have no idea where the funds will come from!' We thought for a moment that you actually were expecting us to give it...."

This Church...your church...make no mistake today...you who hear this sermon and you who will read it in the coming days...YOU are exactly who I expect to give it and I believe that your Finance Committee and your Canvass leaders all agree. However, more importantly, God expects it, too. As a matter of fact, He is watching you...se hold on.

MONEY IS AT THE CENTER The roots for this sermon go back several months. One evening back in the late Spring, I was sitting watching the CBS Evening News with Dan Rather. That evening almost the entire 30 minute segment was devoted to money and to finances.

The news started in the Capitol Building in Washington where the President, the Senate and the House of Representatives were hammering out a compromise budget that would pass both the House and the Senate. It dominated the media. It impacts the finances of the elderly, the poor, the rich, the doctors, the lawyers, the Indian Chiefs...everybody...nobody escapes from this budget.

Money is at the center of most domestic disputes, sports contracts, the Middle East crisis, and thousands of other activities in our world. And with such attention given to the accumulation and the distribution of money, it's amazing how few individuals turn to the Bible for God's viewpoint and God's insights.

Please don't misunderstand me today. This sermon is not designed to beat or to manipulate anyone into giving money to the church. But hopefully, you may hear something that will be successful in leading you into spiritual growth and enthusiastic discipleship by being obedient to God's desires for our lives. When we learn to give and to share God's way, a great spiritual power is unleased in the human soul that helps draw others to the saving and redeeming knowledge of Christ. Then we are set free from the shackling power of materialism and of secularism and consumerism and then we can begin to soar to unknown heights in our individual journey of faith.

Churchill it was, I believe, who once said that,

"We make a living by what we get, but we make a life by what we give."

With that in mind, let's dig in on this stewardship concern together and let me share two things for you to turn over in your thinking as all of us pause to consider our pledge of financial support to this church in the coming days.

A DISCIPLE GIVES OUT OF COMMITMENT, NOT EMOTION of a sense of commitment, not emotions.

First-off, I believe that a disciple of Christ gives out

A story is going around about a circus athlete who dazzled the crowds by displaying some astonishing feats of physical strength. His act would conclude with a simple but very impressive demonstration of strength as he squeezed an orange dry. After completing his act, he would then challenge his audience to produce anyone who could extract even one drop of juice from the squeezed fruit.

One night a little whisp of a man stepped forward to accept the challenge. The crowd snickered when they saw how small he was but undaunted by their doubts, the man stepped onto the stage and took the shriveled-up orange from the hand of the circus star. And then bracing himself, he slowly and firmly compressed his right hand. Every eye was on him and the atmosphere was charged with electricity. A moment or two went by.

And then, to everyone's amazement, a drop of orange juice formed and dripped to the floor. As the cheers of the crowd subsided, the circus performer beckened to the man to come forward. He asked him his name and invited him to tell the crowd just how he managed to develop such strength. "Nothing to it...really" replied the man. And then with a grin, he added,

"I happen to be the treasurer of the local Baptist Church."

It is unfortunate that many churches have forced their pastors and their Finance Committees to put the "squeeze" on people for money to run the church, with the results that some folks do get uptight and unhappy when the subject is raised. Fortunately, Jacque and Jim and John haven't had to do that here... thanks to your generosity. It's been going well in recent years. The money does get raised and our bills and commitments are met. But another year now faces us and we hope and pray that you will want to "take a caring step" up the ladder in what you give to keep the momentum going in this unique church.

I recently heard a story about a woman who went to church with a one dollar bill and a one hundred dollar bill in her pocketbook. It was her intention to put the one dollar bill in the plate as the ushers took up the offering, but as the Doxology was being sung, she discovered that she had made a great mistake. Yes...you guessed it...she had put the one hundred dollar bill in the plate instead of the one dollar bill. Perhaps you know how she might have felt.

Anyway, after the service, she told the Head Usher about the mistake and she rambled on how God would be crediting her "account" with a \$100 contribution. The head usher startled her by giving her back the one hundred dollar bill and taking her one dollar bill which he then put into the offering plate...all of which was soon to be counted by the ushers. He said to her,

"This is what you really intended to give, and now I know it also..."

How would you have handled it. Never lose sight of the fact that you give and you share out of "commitment"...not mistakes.

The goal of Christianity is not "detachment" from material wealth, but the honest accuiring of it and the loving use of it. Three little boys in Sunday School stepped forward to make their offering and as was the custom, they were encouraged to say a Bible verse with their gift. The first little boy stood there and said, "The Lord loves a cheerful giver" and dropped in his gift. The second little boy stepped forward and said, "It is better to give than to receive". The Sunday School teacher smiled. The third little boy then stepped up and said, "A fool and his money is soon parted".

When trying to decide how much to give, the most helpful story in the Bible to me continues to be the story of the Widow's Mite. For it seems to communicate the truth that "what counts" is not how much you give, but how much is left after you give. Who knows, maybe a tithe for you is too little. Yes, "live simply that others may simply live" was the message on the bulletin board.

Money is not grimy or inherently filthy or evil. We wouldn't take it up to the altar and sing the Doxology as we do and pray for its rightful use and distribution through our connectional church if it were. The purpose of money depends entirely on its use to which it is directed. How proud I am to be associated with a church that gives away as much as it does each year, but....we can always do better.

GIVING - A PART OF OUR WORSHIP OF HIM

Secondly, God intended for giving to be a part of our worship of Him.

It does reflect the priorities and the purposes of our lives, doesn't it.

One of the great contrasts between the Widow in Mark's Cospel and the Rich

Men who were also giving gifts had to do with the conditions under which they were giving. The "rich men" gave to impress men; the widow to worship and to honor God. Jesus noticed the sacrifice of her gift and He also noticed the stinginess of the other givers. Remember, in just two chapters He would be sacrificing His life for the world.

We always think of Martin Luther on the last Sunday of October. Luther once stated that every person needs three conversions: the head, the heart and the pocketbook. And he further declared,

"I have had many things in my hands, and I have lost them all, but whatever I have placed in the hands of God, that I still possess!"

And in that great hymn of his which we sang earlier in our service,

"Let goods and kindred go, this mortal life also.

The body they may kill, God's truth abideth still,
His kingdom is forever."

WHAT INTERESTS GOD

I suppose it is possible to give money to God and still cling to it in your heart. Ask the woman who put in the one hundred dollar bill. I think what God is interested in is your COMMITMENT and your relationship to Him that your giving represents. I believe that our responsible stewardship of money always determines and demonstrates our stewardship of all the other gifts and resources God has endowed us with. If you BLOW this one, chances are you will BLOW IT ALL.

Recently in going through my sermon notebook where I put in stories and quotes and clippings I came across an illustration that I have never used. It's been there for a while and here it is. It says,

"Dear Lord.

I've been re-reading the record of the Rich Young Ruler and his obviously wrong choice. But it has set me thinking. No matter how much wealth he had, he could not

- ride in a care,
- have any surgery,
- turn on a light,
- buy penicillin,
- hear a pipe organ,
- watch TV
- wash dishes in running water,
- type a letter,
- mow a lawn,
- fly in an airplane,
- sleep on an innerspring mattress,
- or talk on the phone,

IF he was rich...then what am I?

We are truly rich when we have faith in Christ that permeates everything that we are and do. Dr. Ralph Sockman once said in a sermon,

"There was a time when we fooled ourselves by believing too much....but now I think many of us are fooling ourselves by believing too little."

As churches all across our land attempt to claim the decade of the ninsties as our Decade of Destiny, let us not "fool ourselves" that we can do a great work for God by giving God anything less than our time, our talents, our tithes. Take a caring step up this year. Remember that,

"Giving is not an obligation to be hated or a touchy subject to sidestep. But giving is an opportunity to share in some great work that Christ is doing in this world of ours."

And the only "squeezing" we will do is when we are gathered together in prayer and in worship...to uphold each other on this journey through life.
